#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class explores Italy mainly through writing. Each student will develop a body of essays, interviews, and other work, all rooted in the experience of living and traveling in Italy. Class discussion will focus on interesting examples of writing about Italy, from the past and present, and on the process of writing and revision, developing each student's editorial skills, individual voice and sense of audience. The culminating project will be collaborative production of *Secret Places of Macerata*, essays and photos compiled for the benefit of future students. The course entails a combination of reading, writing and discussion, with no exams.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the end of the term, students should be able to understand the elements of an effective interview, travel narrative, opinion essay, and dramatic monologue. They should gain a greater appreciation for those who write well about Italy, past and present. They should also be able to write confidently and edit efficiently in the forms listed above.

### INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY

Class will be discussion-based, with short mini-lectures to introduce material. Discussions of readings from the packet will be evidence-based (using the evidence found in the texts we read). At several points in the term there will be individual writing conferences. Periodically, class will be conducted as a writing workshop, including peer editing, and, if agreeable to the students, discussions of student work.

# **METHOD OF EVALUATION (GRADING)**

Ten Papers (including 3 rewrites): 10% each, for a total of 100% Participation in Discussion, Presentations: bonus credits possible (maximum 10%)
